

Dioramas

Three theatrical dioramas set the scene for the Desert Campaign, the Western Front and the Home Front. The sound effects of a WW1 battle scene accompanied the Western Front diorama, activated by a PR sensor. This proved particularly effective and atmospheric.

Interpretive panels and design

35 interpretive panels and 5 backdrops set in Ekarv style [an easy-to-read system] text with images drawn largely from the Australian War Memorial and Army Museum of WA were designed inhouse. Specialist military history material was contributed by volunteer Neville Browning OAM, author and military historian.

Photographs of York places taken by participants in the photography workshops were incorporated whenever possible.








Perth-based design firm Flametree Creative were commissioned to produce a logo encapsulating the essence of the exhibition [part of the Shire purchase of goods and services] plus an advertisement which was used in print and social media, and supplied the floral image used in the logo.









Rest area with Biography booklets/ Family/children's hands-on activities

A comfy sofa rest area to combat 'exhibition fatigue' – the well known phenomenon of needing a rest and break in large exhibitions – provided booklets about each person and plenty of hands-on activities for children.

'build your own dugout' area with sandbags,

a replica Lee Enfield rifle to enable visitors to feel the enormous weight that WW1 soldiers had to carry:

Home Front activities such as rolling up bandages to help the Red Cross, knitting socks for soldiers, making poppies

A selection of children's Anzac story books.

A Scavenger Hunt quiz around the exhibition was also provided.

Many families with children were observed using this area for long periods of time [20-40 minutes] with a lot of inter-generational activity going on, so this area worked very well.



Cinema mini-theatrette

This section was designed by the WA Museum using text supplied by us to provide a York focus, featuring stories of three WW1 poets, including a York man and a Perth woman, giving a re-useable small exhibit that could be flatpacked and then used on Anzac/Remembrance Days in years to come.

A large screen TV and some of the original Town Hall gallery seating and an original projector, all of WW1 era linked to the previous section in the main exhibition which featured the stories of two Returned Soldiers of York who ran Picture Shows here in the hall in the 1920s.







Inside Theatrette

A large screen TV showed unique, never before seen photographs of Gallipoli taken by a local serviceman accompanied by captions and a soundtrack of a haunting melody to create a reflective, contemplative mood in the visitor on leaving the exhibition.

Sound effects

As mentioned, WW1 battle sounds accompanied the Western Front diorama and mood music accompanied the film.

As visitors leave the theatrette, they trigger a soundscape of the 'Last Post' whilst viewing panels citing The Ode and a Roll of Honour of all who served from York.

Comments in the visitors' book and post-it survey confirm this section proved a very moving experience.

Community participation

Many figures were made over the preceding years with the involvement of local families, York District High School and community groups and this part of the project was designed primarily around community participation.


There was no method of monitoring visitor numbers to the exhibition. However as MOST visitors who went to the Visitor Centre visited the exhibition, according to observations by staff and volunteers, the figures are proportionally representative.


May visitor figures were counted manually as were 2017 figures. The percentage increase in 2018 was 86%. All weekdays showed increases.













During June a new automated counter was installed. The percentage visitor increase is 194% by automated count, 38% by manual count comparison; the average between these is 116%.


Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays showed increases.




The percentage increase for July is 89% and only Saturdays showed increases, however this was a marked increase.





Visitor Comments Book Analysis

From 24/4/18 to 29/7/18 1620 persons had commented in the visitor comments book.


This was calculated as follows:

A single signature= 1 person

If two persons were mentioned within one comment, eg "Mr & Mrs Smith = 2 persons


If a family was mentioned eg 'The Smith Family' = 3 persons [likely to have been more but conservative estimates applied]

If a group or organisation was mentioned – eg 'Mundaring Historical Society' =1person[as there is no way of ascertaining how many were in group].




Not all visitors who sign the comments book indicated geographic origin. However the numbers are probably indicative of the relative proportions of visitors' geographic origins.

Comments by type are a general indicator of 'overall impression' of the exhibition. Visitors did not remark much about particular aspects of the exhibition, this is usual in comments books and is the reason post-it and tracking surveys were undertaken. There was overwhelming praise of the quality and thanks for holding the exhibition. York as a Town/Shire was praised in a general sense of appreciating its heritage as well as for holding/organising the exhibition.



Adjectives and feelings expressed within the comments were grouped by type to understand the affective response of visitors. Most frequent were adjectives that emphasised the overall quality and positive impression of the exhibition. The thanks, expressions of tributes to Anzacs and comments that expressed how emotionally moving visitors found the exhibition are indicators of the successful transmission of messages inherent in the exhibition. Also featuring strongly was an appreciation of the community effort and that of organisers to create the exhibition.
